Group fights to keep families together

Fractured Families works to help parents who have had their children taken away because of medical issues that were mistaken for abuse

Rebecca Wanosik spent months fighting for custody of her children in 2015, and now she has joined forces with four other women who are battling to keep other families united.

Wanosik, along with Bria Huber and Rana Tyson, of Texas, Cynthia Ross, of Maine, and Christine Jackson, of Massachusetts, is waiting for 501c3 status to be and stretchy, fragile skin. approved for Fractured Families, a new

nonprofit dedicated to helping families who have been falsely accused of child abuse because of unexplained bone fractures in their infants.

> All five Fractured Families board members have been accused of child abuse, and all five women have children who have been diagnosed with Ehlers-Danlos Syndrome, an inherited connective tissue disorder, which according to the Mayo Clinic causes overly flexible joints

Stoutland ranch uses equine therapy to help veterans with PTSD

A ranch at Stoutland helps veterans suffering from Post Traumatic Stress Disorder by using horses as healers.

Rick Morrow from Heroes Rein Ranch spoke about the ranch's therapeutic work with veterans and emergency workers at Thursday's Lebanon Rotary Club luncheon.

Morrow has been a minister for more than 21 years and has been around horses since he was a young boy. He said the ranch's mission was "to provide health and well-being to our nation's heroes, veterans, firefighters, police officers and their families through healing horsemanship and other equine-assisted activities."

According to Morrow, there are numerous studies showing the benefits of equine therapy, especially for people with Post Traumatic Stress Disorder
